## **EDITORIAL**

Dear Readers,

The inaugural volume of LexGaze Law Review is at its essence an attempt towards furthering quality research in the field of legal education. LexGaze is one such endeavour born in April, 2020. We at LexGaze strive towards ensuring that students and members of the legal fraternity and other allied fields around India, and by extension- the world over, do not suffer from an intellectual dearth and are able to traverse along their chosen path of learning.

Keeping in view the aforesaid, a large number of intellectually awakening and thought provoking activities were organised, and are being conducted by LexGaze. Amidst the first initial activities, LexGaze took the initiative of conducting a series of online educational seminars, namely, 'Collocutio', which focused on research and writing research papers. The lag between harbouring a wish to write a research paper and possessing the necessary skill-sets to actually write and publish a research paper has been a long standing bane of the student community. LexGaze via 'Collocutio' attempted to address this essential hurdle towards quality research work. The latest link in the chain of LexGaze is a panel discussion series popularly known as "LexGaze Roundtable", wherein controversial socio-legal subjects are discussed by a panel of experts with the discussion being moderated along pre framed guidelines. Last but not the least, keeping in mind the significance of staying up-to-date with important events as they unfold, especially in the legal profession, a daily bulletin is also released by LexGaze.

The months of back breaking labour and humongous quantities of hard work by the Team LexGaze has now culminated into the inaugural issue; 'Volume I of the LexGaze Law Review'.
